Dear [REDACTED],

Further to the conversation [REDACTED] had with you on my behalf when I was on holiday, in answer to your letter dated 4 July 2013 I would like to explain.

Because of the price of binding machines the SIES passports were assembled at the AES over the last years, [REDACTED] did not have a binding machine and other studbooks also contract out their binding or even passport making to for instance Weatherby's. [REDACTED] were the sole Directors of the AES in those days.

Our Secretary [REDACTED] was still employed by AES on that date and put the passports together, she asked me whether to stamp them out of the food chain. As they were late registrations I told her to do so, after all any Vet or PIO must do this to prevent these horses to enter the food chain.

The request of a change of name is there because of a matter of Identity, the Irish breeders want to have an Irish name whereas the British breeders do not and therefor they can identify themselves with Breeders Elite part of the new name and the Irish breeders can identify themselves with the SIES. Everybody is happy.

Never before has there been an issue about a name change of a Studbook let alone an additional name to an existing studbook, so why now [REDACTED] (DEFRA

2007) sent me an email in which he already approved of the name Breeders Elite. In our previous correspondence through email, 2009 and 2010, the name was also seen as accepted by DARD.

There are no changes in the operating rules of the SIES just new names for the same old sections of the studbook and a slight change of emphasis of things like in the Reception Register, formerly the Auxilliary and Foundation sections brought into one, with the emphasis to maintain as much pedigree as can be found instead of ID only. We did this already since day one but now we wanted to bring this clearer across to the breeders. The ID only passports will also be catered for as old. The rules for entry are still the same.

As the SIES only has few basic operating rules that have proved to be sufficient and effective there will be no reason to change now or in the foreseeable future.

The change of name the full studbook section into BE and the other sections into Reception Register also sets the studbook as a whole, further apart from the AES, a studbook we wish to distance ourselves from.

1. The first part of the document is a letter from the author to the editor, dated 10th March 1954. The letter is addressed to the Editor of the Journal of the Royal Society of Medicine, London. The author is Dr. J. H. Green, of the Department of Pathology, St. Mary's Hospital, London. The letter is a request for the publication of a paper on the subject of 'The Pathology of the Heart in the Elderly'.

The paper is a study of the changes in the heart which occur with increasing age. It is based on a series of autopsies performed on elderly patients who had died of natural causes. The author has found that the heart undergoes a number of changes which are characteristic of old age. These changes include a thickening of the walls of the left ventricle, a narrowing of the coronary arteries, and a general increase in the size of the heart. The author also notes that the changes in the heart are often accompanied by changes in the other organs of the body, particularly the lungs and the kidneys.
