



Sea passengers: methods and quality

Sea passenger statistics published by the DfT cover international and domestic routes.

1. International ferry passenger statistics are collected monthly from ferry operators by DfT. They include drivers of lorries, coaches and other vehicles but exclude passengers on purely domestic routes (see below).

2. Cruise passenger figures include all passengers on international cruise journeys who start and finish their cruise journey at a UK port. Cruise passengers are counted both at the beginning and the end of their cruise. Cruise figures are compiled on an annual basis.

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3. Long sea voyage passengers are those travelling on one-way scheduled voyages to and from ports outside Europe/Mediterranean. In 2012 (the latest year for which data are available) these long sea passengers travelled on the Southampton to New York route. Passengers travelling on cargo vessels (one-way) are not collected.

 4. Passenger figures for domestic ferry routes from Great Britain to Northern Ireland, the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man and are published at the same time as the international ferry figures, they are collected monthly from the ferry operators. They include drivers of lorries, coaches and other vehicles.

Figures for some other sea crossings are also provided annually by the operators, and figures for the sea crossings between Northern Ireland and the Isle of Man are collected monthly from the operators.

Strengths and weaknesses of the data

- The data for international ferry passenger routes, domestic sea crossings and inter-island routes are collected regularly from the operators or, in the case of the crossings to Orkney and Shetland and Scottish inter-island routes, supplied by the Scottish Government. These data sets are quality checked in detail either by the DfT or, before they are supplied, by the Scottish Government, and considered to be extremely robust.
- Long sea voyage data are collected from an operator who also operates cruises. Although the long sea data is usually distinguished from the cruise data this is not always the case. Despite this the cruise and long sea data are considered to be fit for purpose.
- River ferry data are collected from the operators each year where generally the total passenger km figure on the route is over 500 passenger km per year. River ferries that do not meet this criteria are not included in the published data; their passenger figures are checked every few years through direct contact with the operators. River ferry data for publication are quality checked and are considered to be fit for purpose.
