
### Statistical News Release – Drug Misuse: Findings from the 2013/14 Crime Survey for England and Wales

The latest National Statistics on illicit drug use in England and Wales are released today based on self reported data from the 2013/14 Crime Survey for England and Wales (CSEW).

#### Key facts:

- Around 1 in 11 (8.8%) adults aged 16 to 59 had taken **an illicit drug** in the last year. This was a rise from 8.1% in 2012/13, but the same level as in 2011/12.
- According to the 2013/14 CSEW, 3.1% of adults aged 16 to 59 had taken a Class A drug in the last year, equivalent to 985,000 people. The long-term trend in Class A drug use in the last year has been broadly stable over the last few years.

- **The increase was driven by more people saying they had used cocaine, ecstasy, LSD and ketamine in 2013/14, compared with 2012/13.** There were no decreases in last year drug use of any individual drug types among 16 to 59 year olds between 2012/13 and 2013/14. Last year use of **cannabis** among 16 to 59 year olds showed little change between 2012/13 (6.3%) and 2013/14 (6.6%).

## Other findings from 2013/14 CSEW

- Frequency of drug use:
  - **3.1% of adults aged 16 to 59 were defined as frequent drug users** (i.e. those having taken any illicit drug more than once a month on average in the last year) in 2013/14. This is slightly higher than the 2.8% reported in the 2012/13 survey, but similar to 2011/12 (3.2%).
  - **There were differences in levels of frequent drug use among respondents with different personal, household and area characteristics.** For example, levels of frequent use in the last year were higher among men than women, among those who went to pubs or nightclubs more often and among those who lived in more deprived areas.
- Drug use by age and lifestyle factors:
  - **Younger people are more likely to take drugs than older people.** The level of any drug use in the last year was highest among 16 to 19 year olds (19.3%) and lowest among 55 to 59 year-olds (1.5%).
- Estimates of illicit drug use by ethnicity and sexual orientation:
  - Adults from **mixed ethnic backgrounds were the most likely to have taken any illicit drug in the last year** (17.1%) compared with adults from other ethnic groups. Adults from **Asian or Asian British** ethnic backgrounds generally had the **lowest levels of last year drug use** (3.4%).
  - **Gay or bisexual adults** were more likely to have taken any illicit drug in the last year than **heterosexual adults**. In particular, gay or bisexual men were the group most likely to have taken any illicit drug in the last year (33.0% had taken drugs in the last year), with higher levels of illicit drug use than gay or bisexual women (22.9%), heterosexual men (11.1%) and heterosexual women (5.1%).

The release covers the following topics:

- Extent and trends in illicit drug use among adults, including separate analysis of young adults (16 to 24 year olds);
- Frequency of illicit drug use in the last year;
- Illicit drug use by personal, household and area characteristics and lifestyle factors;
- Estimates of illicit drug use by ethnicity and sexual orientation.
