Public health news

Small decrease, but TB rates remain too high

A total of 7,892 cases of tuberculosis (TB) were notified in the UK in 2013, a decrease on the 8,729 cases reported in 2012. The figures are published in the PHE annual [TB in the UK Report](#). Latest figures give an incidence of 12 cases per every 100,000 people in the UK, one of the highest rates of TB in Western Europe. As in previous years, London accounted for the highest proportion of cases in the UK. The report includes a full breakdown by PHE region and centre. New PHE survey finds 12% of 3 year olds have tooth decay

The first national survey of the oral health of 3 year old children in England, published today by PHE, found that those children affected had an average of three decayed teeth due to the disease. According to the [survey](#), there was a dramatic variation of tooth decay prevalence ranging from 2% to 34% across the country. However 88% of children in this age group have no decay at all. This reflects trends of significant improvements in dental health since the introduction of fluoride toothpaste in 1976. For more information see PHE's [press release](#).

Local action on health inequalities: evidence papers

Rugby players: do you really want to share your mate's towel?

An investigation at a rugby club into a serious infection that usually causes boils, abscesses and carbuncles found that some spread among the players may have been caused by the sharing of towels and razors or the same ice bath. The skin condition is called PVL-MSSA. Most active infections present as recurrent boils and abscesses but it can lead to serious infections that can cause the skin and tissues to die and may be life-threatening. Impact of measles infections in England revealed

Measles causes significant absence from school or work and has a much larger impact on people's daily lives than illnesses like flu or chicken pox, according to a new study by researchers from the London School of Hygiene & Tropical Medicine (LSHTM) and PHE. The study, published in the scientific journal [PLOS ONE](#), is the first of its kind to look at the short-term impact of measles on individuals' health-related quality of life. Chief Medical Officer annual report recommends improvements to public mental health services

Chief Medical Officer Professor Dame Sally Davies has made 14 recommendations to improve public mental health services in her annual report 2013 published earlier this month. The report, [Public Mental Health Priorities: Investing in the Evidence](#), looks at the epidemiology of public mental health, the quality of evidence, possible future innovations in science and technology, and the economic case for good mental health. It outlines the importance of treating mental health as equal to physical health and of focusing on the needs and safety of people with mental illness. For more details, see the [press release](#).

Public health funding allocations for 2015 to 2016

The Department of Health has announced that local authorities' public health funding is expected to remain the same as last year, at £2.79 billion. The funding will remain ring-fenced. A further £5 million of funding has also been announced as part of the Health Premium Incentive Scheme. Under the scheme, which will be piloted during 2015 and 2016, local authorities will be rewarded for meeting one mandatory national public health target, related to improving drug and alcohol services, and one local target of their choice. Winter flu campaign

PHE is working with the NHS to plan and implement the national flu immunisation programme. A four week flu marketing campaign begins on 6 October which aims to encourage those at risk to have the flu vaccination "because they need it". It targets under 65 year olds with long-term health conditions, including pregnant women who are at risk of complications and healthy children aged 2-4 years. The campaign will run nationally on radio and in print media with a test TV campaign in the North East.
