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Exceptional weather – get prepared

Whether it be heavy or prolonged rainfall, snowfall or drought conditions, exceptional weather has a way of impacting all aspects of farming, disrupting the farming calendar throughout the year. Getting prepared now can help.

Think about how you will access land, spread or store your slurry and store your milk, access water for your livestock and crops for example. It is really important to plan ahead and build resilience into your business.

Flooding - Farmers and land managers need to be aware of flood risk and be able to plan ahead for extreme weather events. For example, if you can slow down and store excess water on your land to improve absorption, you can reduce the damage done to your soil and crops by runoff during heavy rain. You can also help reduce the risk of flooding on neighbouring farms and in built-up areas. On our website you can [check flood warnings and river levels](#), with current flood warnings and live flood warning maps being updated every 15 minutes. It is strongly recommended to make a [flood plan](#) and register with [Flood Warnings Direct](#) to receive flood warnings free by phone, text or email.

Snowfall - you may have difficulty in accessing land in times of snowfall and may be unable to spread your manures and slurries. Ensuring that you have the correct amount of appropriate storage or an alternative disposal method is essential. Spreading in winter not only wastes valuable nutrients and increases the risk of soil damage but it is also an offence to spread slurry during the closed periods in an NVZ.

Drought - It may seem a long way off until we may face drought conditions, however that's where getting prepared now can really help. Have you thought about [rainwater harvesting](#), or [building an irrigation reservoir](#), helping you to store winter water and avoid the uncertainties of summer abstraction licence restrictions.

Small sewage discharges – regulatory burden reduced

For owners of septic tanks and package treatment plants the regulatory burden has been reduced. From 1 January 2015 you won't be required to register an exemption for small sewage discharges provided you meet the [general binding rules](#) summarised below.

The discharge is to ground (not in a groundwater source protection zone 1 - check [here](#)) and is of 2m³/day or less from a septic tank or package treatment plant, or

the discharge is to surface water and is of 5m³/day or less from a package treatment plant (discharges from septic tanks are not allowed to surface water)

The discharge does not cause pollution


The septic tank or package treatment plant is maintained in accordance with manufacturer's instructions. (For septic tanks this includes regular emptying/desludging)

The sewage is only domestic (e.g. toilets/sinks/drains in a home or small business)

New discharges are not in or near to a designated sensitive area

If you cannot meet these requirements or you are discharging to ground in a groundwater source protection zone 1, you may need a permit. Please contact our [customer service line](#) who will check this and tell you what you need to do.

Did you know? You must empty your septic tank or package treatment plant whenever it becomes full and you should empty it at least once a year even if it's not full. The company you use to dispose of your waste sludge must be a [registered waste carrier](#).

Derbyshire Derwent Catchment Partnership – launch of farming group

The water environment is affected by every activity that takes place on land as well as through our actions in abstracting, using and returning water to rivers, the ground and the sea. Coordinated action at the catchment level by all those who use water or influence land management is the best way to look after this precious resource. This requires engagement and delivery by stakeholders, supported by the Environment Agency and other organisations. This is particularly important when trying to address the significant pressures placed on the water environment by diffuse pollution from both agricultural and urban sources, and widespread, historical alterations to the natural form of channels. Defra has established the [Catchment Based Approach](#) nationally to support this.

In the Derbyshire Derwent catchment the Derbyshire Wildlife Trust host the [Derbyshire Derwent Catchment Partnership](#). There are five focus groups that include: Farming, Uplands, Wildlife, Climate Change and Flooding and Public Engagement. The intention is for these groups to identify priorities and projects related to the issues and for the steering group to identify where these projects overlap and we can identify funding opportunities.

The Derbyshire Derwent farming group met for the first time in January 2015 and includes representatives from: Environment Agency, Derbyshire Wildlife Trust, NFU East Midlands Region, L A Sharpe Ltd, Natural England, National Trust, Severn Trent Water, Old Waltonians Fishing Club, Chatsworth, Matlock Angling club and Derwent FFC.

Have your say - The Derbyshire Derwent catchment is a part of The [Humber River Basin Management Plan](#) (RBMP). The Humber RBMP sets out ecological status objectives for waterbodies and the measures needed to improve rivers, lakes, estuaries, coasts and groundwater for the Humber Catchment. You are invited to have your say on the objectives and actions proposed for this catchment. The RBMP consultation is open until 10 April 2015.

There are two ways to respond; Either in detail via the [consultations page](#) or you can add your comments to a response being prepared by [Blueprint for Water](#).

Currently the group is looking for funding opportunities to support best practice projects for agricultural land in the catchment. These include Landfill Tax bids, Heritage Life funded projects, working with Severn Trent Water (small land based bids for land management), and Environment Agency funding. Activities considered include waterside fencing, dedicated cattle drinking solutions, fertiliser and pesticide management advice and wetland and river restoration projects.
