NHS Choice Framework Update and Easy-Read Leaflets

At the end of March the Department of Health published an updated version of the NHS Choice Framework for 2015-16. The framework sets out a patients' rights to choice across the health system, where they can find information to help them choose and how to complain if they are not offered choice. Section 5 of the document covers the choices that are offered in maternity services.

In addition, the Department published an easy-read version of the framework which consisted of eight leaflets. Leaflet five corresponds with section 5 of the main document and focusses on maternity services. The primary audience for the leaflets is people with learning difficulties. However, these leaflets will be beneficial for individuals who wish to use them for other reasons, including out of personal preference.

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Healthy Child Programme (HCP) and Early Years

ASQ-3 Questionnaires

From April 2015 health visiting teams should have started using the ASQ-3 questionnaire as part of Healthy Child Programme health and development reviews at age 2-2½. CD-ROMs with British English ASQ materials were distributed to local health visiting leads in March of this year. Integrated Review

From September 2015, local areas are expected to integrate health and early education reviews for 2 year olds. The Early Years Foundation Stage Progress Check at age two (delivered by early years practitioners in a child's early years setting) will be integrated with the Healthy Child Programme health and development review at age 2-2½ (delivered by health visiting teams), to offer a more complete picture of the child, support service planning and improve outcomes.

FGM Information Pack for GPs

An FGM Information Pack for GPs has been launched, containing information and materials to protect girls and care for women with FGM. The pack has been sent to every General Practice in England and contains key documents on risk assessment, patient information leaflets, data collection guidance and an awareness raising DVD

Combating Child Sexual Exploitation – E-Learning Tool

The Child Sexual Exploitation e-learning resource has been developed to help health services staff understand and help children/young people who are at risk or who may be affected by child sexual exploitation. The online learning tool, developed by Brook and funded by the Department of Health, will help healthcare staff in preventing, identifying and responding to child sexual exploitation.

Sexually exploited young people will often continue to use health services after contact with other services has stopped. This provides an opportunity for all frontline healthcare staff, whether receptionists, ambulance staff or clinical professionals, to build trust and provide support to ensure children are heard and get the help they need.

A Call to End Violence against Women and Girls

This progress report (published March 2015) summarises government activity since 2010, building on the annual action plans and setting out our achievements.

During that time, we have:

- introduced legislation to criminalise forced marriage in England and Wales
- rolled out the Domestic Violence Disclosure Scheme (Clare’s Law) and Domestic Violence Protection Orders nationally
- introduced new stalking legislation
- brought in provisions to criminalise ‘revenge pornography’ and possession of depictions of rape
- created a new offence of domestic abuse to capture coercive and controlling behaviour

This report sets out how the government is dealing with child sexual exploitation and responding to the failures that were identified by Professor Alexis Jay and Louise Casey in their recent reviews into child sexual exploitation in Rotherham.

The report includes a comprehensive and targeted set of actions for all parts of the system including healthcare, social care, education, law enforcement and criminal justice agencies.

Combined, these will:

- strengthen accountability and leadership in professions and local government
- address the culture of inaction and denial that led to victims being dismissed and ignored

- improve joint working and information sharing so that agencies intervene early
- strengthen the protection of children who are at risk
- reinforce law enforcement efforts to stop offenders
- provide greater support for victims and survivors
