Preamble to Inspector's Report*

This visit is an unannounced touring inspection, carried out by the nominated inspector accompanied by Animal health Officer, APHA (Preston).
The circus is operating under a current valid license.

The Circus Management and staff provided all necessary details and access to areas during the inspection.

The information supplied prior to the inspection was verified and found to be correct, with the exception of the removal of Sabia the female camel which had been euthanased in the weeks prior to the inspection. The relevant animals to be inspected were: 2 neutered male reindeer, one solitary male Chapman's Zebra, 1 male adult and one young, Bactrian camel .

At the time of the inspection the Circus was located at a Farm-based site close to a major traffic intersection off a main road close to Bolton, Lancashire The site was on a sloping grassed field with parking for cars adjacent and two substantial areas for outdoor grazing available. At the time of the inspection the site was well drained with easy access.

PERFORMANCE NOTES:

1. Camel and pony rides are offered prior to the performance and at the interval for about 20 minutes in each case. These are at walking pace only, supervised by category A personnel and with two category B personnel to each animal- one leading and the other supporting the rider.
2. Domestic species performances are horses mainly and are basic dressage manoeuvres or simple turns and pedestal stands. Each performance a maximum of 5 minutes.
3. The male adult camel appears in one part of the show which involves a parade round the ring at walking pace. Total time approx 2-3 minutes.
4. In the parade which takes place in the early part of the show the Camel , Zebra, reindeer, mule, llama and horses parade around the ring at walking pace. Approx time as above 2-3 minutes.. All licensed animals appear only in the first half of the show.

The management and staff appear to be making a genuine effort to fully comply with the current requirements and are receptive to constructive advice to ensure ongoing compliance.

Records appear up to date , clearly completed and safely stored. General management and staff competence appears good. The standard of maintenance of infrastructure is high with all wagons and animal quarters being in good condition and fit for purpose. Animals appear well cared for and content. No coercion of animals in performance was noted and in my opinion no animal was subjected to unnecessary stress or any other matter which would compromise welfare. The use of licensed animals in the performance is of very short duration and involves only walking around the ring .

On my last inspection I made 3 recommendations to the operators all of which are now adopted.

The death of the female camel previously held by the circus is already known to the licensing authority together with the circumstances pertaining. This animal was in the care of the university of Liverpool veterinary hospital. As yet the full post mortem results are not completed, but I am advised that the P.M. was carried out at the Liverpool Veterinary Field station "leahurst", where the latter phase of investigation and treatment took place. Further information will be forwarded to the licensing authority on receipt. The animal was taken to this location 20/7/2015 and after investigation subsequently euthanased.

The background to this event is that the breeding of the camels was not specifically planned. Mating behaviour had been seen in previous seasons but had not resulted in any pregnancy and it was thus assumed that breeding was unlikely. No reference to any apparent pregnancy was noted in the veterinary report of March 2015, but a weight gain had been noticed by the operators later in the season and a vet attended at the calving, following which veterinary clearance had been given for travel. Details of the later veterinary treatment will be submitted when the full report is available.

Routine inspection under the Welfare of Wild Animals in Travelling Circuses (England) Regulations 2012

As you know, an unannounced inspection of your travelling circus took place on 6 August 2015 under the Welfare of Wild Animals in Travelling Circuses (England) Regulations 2012 (the "Regulations").

Decision of the Circus Licensing Panel

In summary, the inspector found that current compliance is satisfactory.

As before, a copy of the inspection report is now attached for your information. You are reminded that, where an inspection report's use in deciding the status of a licence has been concluded, it is our usual policy to release inspection reports in response to any Freedom of Information request.

The inspector's findings have been considered by a panel of officials on behalf of the Secretary of State (the "Panel"), who were satisfied that at the time of the visit the conditions of the Regulations appeared to be being complied with and who have recommended that your current licence is allowed to continue.

While the inspector was satisfied that all of the licence conditions are being met by your circus, there were some additional points and recommendations noted that the Panel request you undertake:

1. The Panel noted the inspector's comment that the camel 'Kachana' appeared healthy although slightly underweight for its age. The Panel understands that the camel is being checked and weighed regularly by a vet. The Panel agreed that you

should maintain your daily monitoring of the camel's well-being as well as regular checks of the animal's weight. Any unexpected changes should be brought to the attention of your veterinary advisor and addressed as appropriate. Given that Sabia's pregnancy was not detected until she was giving birth please ensure that such a monitoring and checking regime is standard practice for all the animals under your care, not just Kachana.

2. The Panel noted the inspector's summary of the treatment and death of Sabia, of which it was already aware. As you know, the post-mortem of Sabia is still outstanding, and you are reminded to send a copy of it to Defra as soon as you receive it.
3. The Panel noted that the inspector's comment that there was still an unused bottle of Ceporex suspension for the treatment of Sabia in your drug cabinet. The bottle was unlabelled (although the inspector states that a previous bottle had been labelled). However, this is a prescription only veterinary medicine. Therefore, the Panel would like you to confirm that the details of the prescribing veterinary surgeon are in Sabia's records and that the medicine has now been disposed of safely.
4. The Panel were also aware that Defra has not received an updated stock list since Defra was informed of the death of Sabia. Can you please update your stock list and send an updated copy to Defra as soon as possible. The Panel also agreed that you should be reminded that as the camel 'Kachana' is now approaching three months of age you should be making preparations for getting the camel microchipped. Again, your stock list will need updating, with a copy sent to Defra, as soon as this is done.
5. Finally, the Panel noted the inspector's comments that you had no venues arranged after the end of August. This corresponds with the tour itinerary information you have already sent Defra. However, the Panel agreed to remind you that Defra should be updated in good time on any updates to your itinerary.

Further Inspections

We made clear to you when issuing your licence that there would be at least two additional inspections during the year. The inspection on 6 August 2015 represented one of these inspections. There will be at least one further announced inspection during the year. The Secretary of State also retains the power to undertake further announced or unannounced inspections during the remaining period of your licence. Additional inspections may also be required in response to changes in your stock list, any complaints received or concerns raised about the wild animals in your circus.

You will usually be charged for the costs of any further inspection visits, once they have taken place.
