Pathfinder prisons phase 3

Pathfinders are defined as those prisons who are recommending BBV testing to people in prison and have a well-defined care pathway for individuals testing positive as per national guidance and who are being included in a formal evaluation to support implementation across wider prison estate. As part of the pathfinder programme these prisons will be evaluated after 6 months of implementation of the opt-out BBV testing policy to inform roll-out of the programme across the whole adult estate in England by Q4 2016/17. Following the success of the phase 1 programme in 2014, there are now 10 prisons implementing the opt-out BBV testing work as part of the phase 2 roll out (see table 1). Phase 3 pathfinders (see table 2) have also been identified to start as part of the next stage of the roll out programme.

The phase 2 pathfinders will be evaluated towards the end of the year and the report will be published in March 2016. The phase 3 pathfinders will be evaluated during July to September 2016 and the report will be published in December 2016. Full implementation across the estate is hoped by March 2017.

HCV Action / PHE hepatitis C roadshows
