Summary

Influenza activity remains at low levels in week 46 (ending 15 November 2015)

- [Community influenza surveillance](#)
 - In week 46, a number of respiratory indicators have shown further increases in children aged <1 year, these increases are in line with reports of increasing respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) activity.
 - Two new acute respiratory outbreaks have been reported in the past seven days, one in a care home and one in a primary school. Test results are not available for both.
- [Overall weekly influenza GP consultation rates across the UK](#)
 - In week 46, overall weekly influenza-like illness GP consultations remained low in England (7.9 per 100,000), Wales (5.1 per 100,000), Scotland (5.0 per 100,000) and Northern Ireland (15.1 per 100,000).
 - Weekly influenza-like illness consultations rates also remain low in week 46 through the GP In Hours Surveillance system.
- [Influenza-confirmed hospitalisations](#)
 - Three new admissions to ICU/HDU with confirmed influenza were reported through the USISS mandatory ICU/HDU surveillance scheme across the UK (122 Trusts in England) in week 46, a rate of 0.01 compared to 0.00 per 100,000 the previous week.
 - Four new hospitalised confirmed influenza cases (two influenza A(H1N1pdm09) and two B) were reported through the USISS sentinel hospital network across England (16 Trusts), a rate of 0.06 compared to 0.01 per 100,000 the previous week.
 - No confirmed influenza ECMO admissions were reported in week 46.
- [All-cause mortality data](#)
 - In week 46 2015, no statistically significant excess all-cause mortality by week of death was seen through the EuroMoMo algorithm in England overall and by age group and across the devolved administrations.
- [Microbiological surveillance](#)
 - Two samples tested positive for influenza through GP sentinel schemes across the UK.
 - Nine influenza positive detections were recorded through the DataMart scheme (three influenza A(H1N1)pdm09 and six influenza B). A positivity of 0.94% was seen, with the highest positivity in 15-44 year olds (2.02%).
- [Vaccination](#)
 - Up to week 46 2015 in 80.6% GP practices reporting weekly to Immform, the provisional proportion of people in England who had received the 2015/16 influenza vaccine in targeted groups was as follows: 36.6% in under 65 years in a clinical risk group, 35.0% in pregnant women, 62.5% in 65+ year olds, 23.0% in all 2 year olds, 24.0% in all 3 year olds and 19.4% in all 4 year olds.
 - Provisional data from the first monthly collection of influenza vaccine uptake by frontline healthcare workers show 32.4% were vaccinated by 31 October 2015 from 95.1% of Trusts, compared to 36.8% vaccinated in the previous season by 31 October 2014.
- [International situation](#)
 - Globally, influenza activity generally remained low in both hemispheres.
 - Influenza activity in Europe remains low and there is no indication that the influenza season has started.

In week 46, a number of respiratory indicators continue to show increases in children aged <1 year, these increases are in line with reports of increasing respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) activity.


- PHE Real-time Syndromic Surveillance

-During week 46, there were increases in a number of respiratory indicators in children aged <1 year across all syndromic surveillance systems. These increases are in line with recent reports of increasing respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) activity.

- Acute respiratory disease outbreaks

- Two new acute respiratory outbreaks have been reported in the past 7 days. One from a care home and one from a primary school with no test results available for either of them.


-Outbreaks should be recorded on HPZone and reported to the local Health Protection Teams and Respscidsc@phe.gov.uk.



- FluSurvey

-Internet-based surveillance of influenza in the general population is undertaken through the FluSurvey project (<http://flusurvey.org.uk>) run by the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine and PHE.


-Data is expected later in the season.



Weekly consultation rates in national sentinel schemes

In week 46 overall weekly influenza-like illness GP consultations were low in England, Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland.

- Influenza/Influenza-Like-Illness (ILI)



Northern Ireland

-The Northern Ireland influenza consultation rate was low at 15.1 per 100,000 in week 46 (Figure 3) and below the pre-epidemic threshold (49 per 100,000).

-The highest rates were seen in the <1 year olds (53.8 per 100,000) and 1-4 year olds (41.6 per 100,000).

Wales

-The Welsh influenza rate was low at 5.1 per 100,000 in week 46 (Figure 3).

-The highest rates were seen in 15-44 year olds (8.07 per 100,000) and 45-64 year olds (5.67 per 100,000).

Scotland


-The Scottish ILI rate was low at 5.0 per 100,000 in week 46 (Figure 3) and below the pre-epidemic threshold (37 per 100,000).

-The highest rates were seen in 45-65 year olds (8.1 per 100,000), 15-44 year olds (5.2 per 100,000) and 75+ year olds (3.7 per 100,000).

RCGP (England and Wales)

-The weekly ILI consultation rate through the RCGP surveillance system was low at 7.9 in week 46 and below the pre-epidemic threshold (15.4 per 100,000) (Figure 4*). By age group, the highest rate was seen in 45-64 year olds (11.6 per 100,000).

**The Moving Epidemic Method has been adopted by the European Centre for Disease Prevention and Control to calculate thresholds for GP ILI consultations for the start of influenza activity in a standardised approach across Europe. The threshold to indicate a likelihood of influenza community circulation for as calculated through the Moving Epidemic Method is 15.4 per 100,000.*




GP In Hours Syndromic Surveillance System (England)

-The weekly ILI consultation rate through the GP In Hours Syndromic Surveillance system was low at 5.5 per 100,000 in week 46 (Figure 5).

Figure 5 represents a map of GP ILI consultation rates in Week 46 across England by Local Authorities, using influenza-like illness surveillance thresholds.

Thresholds are calculated using a standard methodology for setting ILI thresholds across Europe (the "Moving Epidemic Method" (MEM)) and are based on six previous influenza seasons (excluding the 2009/10 H1N1 pandemic)

Influenza confirmed hospitalisations




In week 46, three new admissions to ICU/HDU with confirmed influenza was reported through the national USSS mandatory ICU scheme across the UK (122 Trusts in England). Four new hospitalised confirmed influenza cases (two influenza A(H1N1pdm09) and two B) were reported through the USSS sentinel hospital network across England (16 Trusts).

A national mandatory collection (USSS mandatory ICU scheme) is operating in cooperation with the Department of Health to report the number of confirmed influenza cases admitted to Intensive Care Units (ICU) and High Dependency Units (HDU) and number of confirmed influenza deaths in ICU/HDU across the UK. A confirmed case is defined as an individual with a laboratory confirmed influenza infection admitted to ICU/HDU. In addition a sentinel network (USSS sentinel hospital network) of acute NHS trusts is established in England to report weekly laboratory confirmed hospital admissions. Further information on these systems is available through the [website](#). Please note data in previously reported weeks are updated and so may vary by week of reporting.


- Number of new admissions and fatal confirmed influenza cases in ICU/HDU (USISS mandatory ICU scheme), UK (week 46)

-In week 46, three new admissions to ICU/HDU with confirmed influenza were reported across the UK (122/156 Trusts in England) through the USISS mandatory ICU scheme (Figures 6 and 7), a rate of 0.01 per 100,000 compared to 0.00 per 100,000 the previous week. No new confirmed influenza deaths were reported in week 46 2015. A total of 17 admissions (three influenza A(H1N1)pdm09, two influenza A(H3N2), nine influenza A unknown subtype and three influenza B) and no confirmed influenza deaths have been reported since week 40 2015.



- USISS sentinel weekly hospitalised confirmed influenza cases, England (week 46)

-In week 46, four new hospitalised confirmed influenza cases (two influenza A(H1N1)pdm09) and two B) were reported through the USISS sentinel hospital network from 16 NHS Trusts across England (Figure 8), a rate of 0.06 per 100,000 compared to 0.01 per 100,000 the previous week. A total of 35 hospitalised confirmed influenza admissions (19 A(H1N1)pdm09), five A(H3N2), five A unknown subtype and six B) have been reported since week 40.



- USISS Severe Respiratory Failure Centre confirmed influenza admissions, England (week 45)

-In week 46, no new confirmed influenza admissions to the five Severe Respiratory Failure Centres in England were reported.

All-cause mortality data



In week 46 2015, no statistically significant excess all-cause mortality by week of death was seen through the EuroMoMo algorithm in England overall and by age group and across the devolved administrations.

Seasonal mortality is seen each year in the UK, with a higher number of deaths in winter months compared to the summer. Additionally, peaks of mortality above this expected higher level typically occur in winter, most commonly the result of factors such as cold snaps and increased circulation of respiratory viruses, in particular influenza. Weekly mortality surveillance presented here aims to detect and report acute significant weekly excess mortality above normal seasonal levels in a timely fashion. Excess mortality is defined as a significant number of deaths reported over that expected for a given point in the year, allowing for weekly variation in the number of deaths. The aim is not to assess general mortality trends or precisely estimate the excess attributable to different factors, although some end-of-winter estimates and more in-depth analyses (by age, geography etc.) are undertaken.

- Excess overall all-cause mortality, England and Wales

-In week 45 2015, an estimated 9,994 all-cause deaths were registered in England and Wales (source: Office for National Statistics). This is an increase compared to the 9,618 estimated death registrations in week 44, and is below the 95% upper limit of expected death registrations for the time of year as calculated by PHE (Figure 1).



- Excess all-cause mortality by age group, England, Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland

-In week 46 2015, no excess mortality by date of death above the upper 2 z-score threshold was seen in England after correcting ONS disaggregate data for reporting delay with the standardised EuroMoMo algorithm (Figure 2, Table 1), in any age group or subnationally. This data is provisional due to the time delay in registration; numbers may vary from week to week.

-No excess mortality above the threshold through the same standardised algorithm was seen across the Devolved Administrations in week 46 (Table 2).



Microbiological surveillance

In week 46 2015, two samples tested for influenza through the UK GP sentinel schemes were positive. Nine influenza positive detections were recorded through the DataMart scheme (three influenza A(H1N1)pdm09 and six influenza B).

- Sentinel swabbing schemes in England (RCGP) and the Devolved Administrations

-In week 46, two samples were positive, one in Scotland (influenza B) and one in Wales (influenza A(H1N1)pdm09) (Table 3).





- Respiratory DataMart System (England)

In week 46 2015, out of the 960 respiratory specimens reported through the Respiratory DataMart System, 9 samples (0.9%) were positive for influenza (3 A(H1N1)pdm and 6 B, Figure 9*). The highest positivity was in the 15-44 years, 2.0%. The overall positivity for RSV continued to increase in week 46, which was mainly observed in children under 5 years (37.3%) (Figure 10). Positivity for parainfluenza increased slightly to 6.4% in week 46. Positivity for rhinovirus decreased to 12.7%. Adenovirus and hMPV remained low at 3.7% and 1.5%, respectively (Figure 11).



*The Moving Epidemic Method has been adopted by the European Centre for Disease Prevention and Control to calculate thresholds for GP ILI consultations for the start of influenza activity in a standardised approach across Europe. The threshold to indicate a likelihood of influenza community circulation for Datamart % positive as calculated through the Moving Epidemic Method is 7.4% in 2015/16.

- Virus characterisation

The PHE Respiratory Virus Unit has isolated and antigenically characterised two A(H3N2) influenza viruses from week 38, prior to the start of the 2015/16 winter influenza season in week 40 2015. The two viruses were antigenically similar to the A/Switzerland/9715293/2013 H3N2 Northern Hemisphere 2015/16 vaccine strain. Genetic characterisation of six A(H3N2) influenza viruses since week 38 showed that they belong to genetic group 3C.2a, and are genetically similar to the majority of A(H3N2) viruses circulating in the 2014/15 season.

Eighteen A(H1N1)pdm09 influenza viruses have been isolated and antigenically characterised since the start of the 2015/16 winter influenza season in week 40 2015. These 18 viruses were antigenically similar to the A/California/7/2009 Northern Hemisphere 2015/16 (H1N1)pdm09 vaccine strain.

One influenza B virus has been isolated and antigenically characterised since week 40 2015. This virus was characterised as belonging to the B/Victoria/2/87 lineage and was antigenically similar to B/Brisbane/60/2008, the influenza B/Victoria-lineage component of 2015/16 Northern Hemisphere quadrivalent vaccines.

- Antiviral susceptibility

Since week 40 2015, 15 and 7 influenza viruses (A(H1N1)pdm09) have been tested for oseltamivir and zanamivir susceptibility respectively, in the UK, and all were found to be sensitive.

- Antimicrobial susceptibility


-Table 4 shows in the 12 weeks up to 15 November 2015, the proportion of all lower respiratory tract isolates of *Streptococcus pneumoniae*, *Haemophilus influenzae*, *Staphylococcus aureus*, MRSA and MSSA tested and susceptible to antibiotics. These organisms are the key causes of community acquired pneumonia (CAP) and the choice of antibiotics reflects the British Thoracic Society empirical guidelines for management of CAP in adults.



- Up to week 46 2015 in 80.6% of GP practices reporting weekly to Immform, the provisional proportion of people in England who had received the 2015/16 influenza vaccine in targeted groups was as follows (Figure 14)
 - 36.6% in under 65 years in a clinical risk group
 - 35.0% in pregnant women
 - 62.5% in 65+ year olds



- In 2015/16, all two-, three- and four-year-olds continue to be eligible for flu vaccination. In addition, the programme has been extended to children of school years 1 and 2 age. Up to week 46 2015 in 80.6% of GP practices reporting weekly to Immform, the provisional proportion of people in England who had received the 2015/16 influenza vaccine in targeted groups was as follows (Figure 15)
 - 23.0% in all 2 year olds
 - 24.0% in all 3 year olds
 - 19.4% in all 4 year olds



- Provisional data from the first monthly collection of influenza vaccine uptake by frontline healthcare workers show 32.4% were vaccinated by 31 October 2015 from 95.1% of Trusts, compared to 36.8% vaccinated in the previous season by 31 October 2014. The [report](#) provides uptake at national, area team and CCG level.

Globally, influenza activity generally remained low in both hemispheres.

- [Europe](#) updated on 13 November 2015 (Joint ECDC-WHO Influenza weekly update)

For week 45, influenza activity was at low levels in the 42 countries which reported.

For week 45/2015, seven out of 427 (1.6%) specimens from sentinel sources collected across 24 countries tested positive for influenza virus and 64 of 5487 (1.2%) specimens from non-sentinel sources in ten of the 23 countries that tested.

- [United States of America](#) Updated on 13 November 2015 (Centre for Disease Control report)

During week 44, influenza activity was low in the United States, with the most frequently identified type reported to be influenza A with influenza A(H3) viruses predominating.

Nationwide during week 44, 1.4% of patient visits reported through the U.S. Outpatient Influenza-like Illness Surveillance Network (ILINet) were due to influenza-like illness (ILI). This percentage is below the national baseline of 2.1%.

During week 44, 5.7% of all deaths reported through the 122 Cities Mortality Reporting System were due to P&I. This percentage was below the epidemic threshold of 6.2%. No influenza-associated paediatric deaths have been reported for the 2015-2016 season.

- [Canada](#) Updated on 13 November 2015 (Public Health Agency report)

Overall, Canada continues to experience low influenza activity. So far this season, influenza A(H3N2) has been the most common subtype affecting Canadians.

The number of positive influenza detections increased from 0.88% in week 43 to 1.2% in week 44. To date, 90% of influenza detections have been influenza A and the majority of those subtyped have been A(H3) (87%).

The national influenza-like-illness (ILI) consultation rate increased from 17.8 per 1,000 visits in week 43 to 33.9 per 1,000 visits in week 44. In week 43, the highest ILI consultation rate was found in the 5-19 age group and the lowest was found in the ≥65 years of age group.

To date this season, nine laboratory-confirmed influenza-associated paediatric (≤16 years of age) hospitalizations have been reported by the Immunization Monitoring Program Active (IMPACT) network. 47 laboratory-confirmed influenza-associated hospitalizations were reported from participating provinces and territories*. The majority (55%) of patients were ≥65 years of age. Five ICU admissions and two deaths have been reported.

- [Global influenza update](#) Updated on 16 November 2015 (WHO website)

Globally, influenza activity generally remained low in both hemispheres.

In the Northern Hemisphere, influenza activity continued at low, inter-seasonal levels with sporadic detections.

Few influenza virus detections were reported by countries in Africa.

In tropical countries of the Americas, Central America and the Caribbean, influenza activity remained at low levels, with the exception of Cuba, where high numbers of severe acute respiratory infections (SARI), associated with influenza A(H1N1)pdm09 virus and RSV, continued to be reported. In Colombia, acute respiratory activity (ARI) again remained slightly elevated with ongoing RSV and influenza A(H3N2) detections.

In western Asia, Bahrain and Qatar reported increased influenza activity, predominantly due to influenza A (H1N1)pdm09.

In tropical Asia, countries in Southern and South East Asia reported low influenza activity overall except India, Lao People's Democratic Republic and Thailand where activity mainly due to A(H1N1)pdm09 virus continued to be reported. Influenza activity declined in southern China. Iran reported increased influenza detections, mostly due to influenza A(H3N2).

In temperate South America, respiratory virus activity continued to decrease in recent weeks. In Chile, ILI activity decreased but remained above expected levels in recent weeks with decreased detections of influenza viruses and RSV.

In Australia, New Zealand, and South Africa, influenza activity continued to decrease to low levels of virus detections with the end of the influenza season in these countries.

Based on FluNet reporting, the WHO GISRS laboratories tested more than 52,883 specimens between 19 October and 01 November 2015. 1,343 were positive for influenza viruses, of which 1,049 (78.1%) were typed as influenza A and 294 (21.9%) as influenza B. Of the sub-typed influenza A viruses, 517 (68.2%) were influenza A(H1N1)pdm09 and 241 (31.8%) were influenza A(H3N2). Of the characterized B viruses, 42 (53.2%) belonged to the B-Yamagata lineage and 37 (46.8%) to the B-Victoria lineage.

- [Avian Influenza](#) latest update on 13 November 2015 (WHO website)

Influenza A(H7N9) latest update on 13 November 2015

On [11 November 2015](#) the National Health and Family Planning Commission (NHFPC) of China notified WHO of 2 additional laboratory-confirmed cases of human infection with avian influenza A (H7N9) virus. Influenza A(H5N1)

From 2003 through 13 November 2015, 844 laboratory-confirmed human cases of H5N1 avian influenza have been officially reported to [WHO](#) from 16 countries, of which 449 (53.2%) have died. Since the last WHO Influenza update on 15 October 2015, no new laboratory-confirmed human cases of avian influenza A(H5N1) virus infection were reported to WHO. Various influenza A(H5) subtypes, such as influenza A(H5N1), A(H5N2), A(H5N3), A(H5N6) and A(H5N8), continue to be detected in birds in West Africa, and Asia, according to recent reports received by OIE. Although these influenza A(H5) viruses might have the potential to cause disease in humans, so far no human cases of infection have been reported, with exception of the human infections with influenza A(H5N1) viruses and the four human infections with influenza A(H5N6) virus detected in China since 2014. Overall, the public health risk assessment for avian influenza A(H5) viruses remains unchanged since the assessment of [17 July 2015](#).

- [Middle East respiratory syndrome coronavirus \(MERS-CoV\)](#) latest update on 13 November 2015

Between [26 October and 1 November 2015](#), the National IHR Focal Point for the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia notified WHO of 7 additional cases of MERS-CoV infection, including one death.

On [12 October 2015](#), the National IHR Focal Point for the Republic of Korea provided follow-up information on a previously reported case of Middle East respiratory syndrome coronavirus (MERS-CoV) infection. The patient, who was diagnosed from hospital on 3 October following two consecutive negative PCR tests for MERS-CoV, was readmitted to hospital with fever on 11 October and tested positive again for MERS-CoV on 12 October. A total of 186 MERS-CoV cases, including 36 deaths, have been associated with the outbreak in the Republic of Korea.

Up to 16 November 2015, a total of four cases of Middle East respiratory syndrome coronavirus, MERS-CoV, (two imported and two linked cases) have been confirmed in England. On-going surveillance has identified 478 suspect cases in the UK that have been investigated for MERS-CoV and tested negative.

Globally, WHO has been notified of 1,618 laboratory-confirmed cases of infection with MERS-CoV, including at least 579 related deaths.
