<p>About this guidance</p> <p>Key facts</p> <p>Entry requirements</p> <p>Grant or refuse entry</p> <p>Conditions of leave</p>	<p>This page tells you about the Tier 5 (Youth mobility scheme) maintenance requirement.</p> <p>An applicant must score 10 points for maintenance. They can claim 10 points if they can show they have personal savings of at least £1,890, on the date of their application for entry clearance.</p> <p>You must calculate whether the applicant meets the maintenance requirement based on the exchange rate at the date the application was submitted.</p> <p>Evidence of funds</p> <p>Evidence must be in the form of documents relating to cash funds, not including any overdraft facilities, held in current or savings accounts. Other accounts financial instruments or investments, for example, shares, bonds, credit card and pension funds, regardless of notice, are not acceptable.</p> <p>The applicant must provide original documents that:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• are dated no more than 31 days before the application is submitted• are on the official letter-headed paper or stationery of the organisation• have the official stamp of that organisation, and• have been issued by an authorised official of that organisation. <p>Acceptable forms of evidence</p> <p>The applicant must provide one of the following as evidence of maintenance:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• personal bank or building society statements:<ul style="list-style-type: none">○ they can provide bank statements printed on the bank's stationery as evidence○ mini-statements from cash points are not acceptable• building society or savings account pass book• letter from the bank confirming funds• letter confirming funds from a financial institution regulated by the official regulatory	<p>In this section</p> <p>Entry requirements</p> <p>Nationality</p> <p>Age</p> <p>Links to staff intranet removed</p>

Information required

The information must clearly show:

- the migrant's name
- the account number and type of account, for example current or savings
- the date of the letter or statement
- the financial institution's name and logo
- that funds of at least £1,890, not including any overdraft facilities, are held in the applicant's account.

Electronic bank statements

Electronic bank statements must contain all of the details listed above. The migrant must also provide:

- A supporting letter from their bank, on company headed paper, confirming the authenticity of the statements provided. Or
- An electronic bank statement bearing the official stamp of the bank in question. This stamp must appear on every page of the statement.

- they cannot use public funds, and
- they must register with the police, if required to do so by paragraph 326 of the Immigration Rules.

Self employment

Self employment is only allowed if:

- the applicant does not own premises where they do business, other than their home, although they may rent premises for the purpose of self employment
- the total value of the equipment they use in their business is no more than £5000, and
- they have no employees.
