

Weekly rainfall and river flow summary

Weekly bulletin: Wednesday 11 to Tuesday 17 May 2016

Summary: Dry across much of England. Flows are mostly normal for the time of year.

Rainfall

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



Figure 1: Weekly precipitation across England and Wales for the past 11 weeks. UKPP radar data (Source: Met Office © Crown Copyright, 2016). Note: Radar beam blockages may give anomalous totals in some areas. Crown copyright. All rights reserved. Environment Agency, 100026380, 2016.

The past week was dry across much of England. Rainfall totals ranged from 2mm in north-east England to 14mm in south-west England (Table 1 and Figure 1). Cumulative rainfall totals for the month to date range from 17% of the May long term average (LTA) in north-east England to 60% in south-east England (Table 1).

River flow

River flows have decreased at all but two sites compared to last week. The latest daily mean flows are [normal](#) or higher for the time of year at four-fifths of the sites, with two-thirds of the sites being [normal](#) for the time of year (Figure 2).

Outlook

A band of rain will affect the west on Thursday. The front will move eastwards during the day and should clear on Friday. Rain and showers will continue to affect most areas on Saturday and Sunday. Monday and Tuesday will continue to be unsettled, with the driest weather in the south and south-east.

¹ Notes:

- LTA = long term average rainfall for 1961 – 1990.
- Data for the current month are calculated using MORECS (Met Office Rainfall and Evaporation Calculation System); data for past months are provisional values from the National Climate Information Centre (NCIC).
- The data is rounded to the nearest millimetre or percent (except when values are less than 1).
- Recorded amounts of rainfall are likely to be underestimated during snow events.

²Flow percentiles describe the percentage of time that a particular flow has been equalled or exceeded compared to the historic flow record for that site for the time of year. Flow percentiles presented relate to an analysis for the time of year and not a whole year.

River flow categories

Exceptionally high	Value likely to fall within this band 5% of the time
Notably high	Value likely to fall within this band 8% of the time
Above normal	Value likely to fall within this band 15% of the time
Normal	Value likely to fall within this band 44% of the time
Below normal	Value likely to fall within this band 15% of the time
Notably low	Value likely to fall within this band 8% of the time
Exceptionally low	Value likely to fall within this band 5% of the time

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
